## **Accreditation Scholarships**

In past years, many state legislators and organizations have invested in opportunities and initiatives that promote high quality care and education to young children and their families. Family child care accreditation through NAFCC is one of those measurable tools that had been proven time and time again to increase quality. The foundation of NAFCC accreditation is relationships. The NAFCC Accreditation Standards are a guide to creating strong relationships. The relationships extend beyond provider-to-child. Relationships are established between providers and parents, child and child, and families to families. Family child care providers who meet the accreditation standards go above and beyond what most state standards require. For a family child care provider who is intentional about the care she provides, NAFCC accreditation is a must! Many providers who have been NAFCC accredited, strongly believe that accreditation has impacted the success of their businesses and effectively supported the growth and development of the children in their care. These providers agree that the investment into their program is worth every penny!

In today's uncertain economy,

funding accreditation can be challenging. Many state have experienced cutbacks in funding from Federal and State government: Utah is no exception. As you may be aware, in accordance with the Budget Control Act of 2011, a series of spending cuts, called sequestration, will cancel approximately 5% of Utah's Child Care Development Fund budget for the current year and the 2014 funding year. The consequences of sequestration will require the Department of Workforce Services/ Office of Child Care to make difficult decisions regarding our budget and funding priorities. As a result, the Utah office of Child Care will no continue to partner with PFCCA to support accreditation initiatives or fund providers through the accreditation process. We are researching other funding options and training to help us create partnerships with other organizations. The PFCCA board has recently been trained with grant writing efforts and techniques. The result of this training will help us lay a foundation for increased funding within the organization.

How does this affect you? If you have participated in the accreditation scholarships offered

through PFCCA, these are no longer available. PFCCA will continue to support accreditation and quality care through effective training offered through our local chapter groups. We will also help provide mentoring if you have questions about the accreditation process. As a professional organization, PFCCA will continue to support providers in their growth and development. We hope that you continue in your efforts to seek NAFCC accreditation, CDA and any other credential and training that encourage quality in our field. Providing care is more that a business, it is the foundation for lifelong learning in children that will eventually be our nation's leaders.







## Three Cheers for School?!?

Across the U.S., education experts are reimagining the school day to make it more engaging, effective and fun. Here are 7 inspiring ideas for a new and improved 21st-century classroom.

- Begin the day with breakfast. When students eat a good, nutritious breakfast, they can hit the ground running. A recent survey found that although 77 percent of young children eat breakfast everyday, only 50 percent of middle schoolers and 36 percent of high schoolers get a regular morning meal. Breakfast consumption may improve cognitive function and school attendance.
- 2) Emphasize Learning, not Testing. As a result of government policies like No Child Left Behind—which requires schools to improve on standardized test performance year over year—educators are overwhelmed with testing and test prep. We are producing many grads who are great test takers but not great learners. Students should know how to deal with confrontation, bounce back from defeat, and see two different sides of a problem. It turns out the students who are most likely to graduate from college aren't necessarily the ones who do best on the standardized tests, but the one who are able to develop these qualities.
- Teach 21st-century skills. Emphasize longterm projects. Students need to develop the skills to revise, perfect, and present. Use technology to augment students work. Finally make classes multidisciplinary (think: digital media arts/geometry).
- 4) Flip the class work. Instead of spending class listening to the teacher lecture, students are sent home with short video lectures, then spend class time having the concepts reinforced.
- Say "YES" to recess. It is counterproductive to push for more academic time without also allowing regular breaks for kids to process what they have learned.
- Get creative! Creative pursuits and those that use tactile learning such as wood shop or cooking engage different parts of students brains.

 Go longer and better. Supplement the school day with more opportunities for learning,



Materials: small, medium and large versions of the following: chairs, bowls, spoons, blankets, pillows, books, cups, pitchers, plates and stuffed bears.

What to do: Set up your dramatic play area to resemble the home of "The Three Bears". Set a small table with the three sizes of bowls and spoons. Put our three sizes of chairs and make three

different size blankets and pillows. Gather the children and tell the story of "The Three Bears" Your might change the ending of the story by letting Goldílocks admít she goofed and apologize and offer to help clean up, repair the chair, or make more porridge. Invite the children to join in saying "Too big", "Too small", or "Just right". You may extend the concept of different sizes into other areas of the room such as: giving each child three sized of playdough chunks, encourage them to build three sizes of buildings in the block area, or put out three sizes of puzzles.



## TRANSITIONS

YOUNG CHILDREN NEED TO BE REMINDED ABOUT ROUTINE. SHORTLY BEFORE A TRANSITION, GIVE THE CHILDREN A WARNING AS TO WHAT IS HAPPENING. THIS IS ESPECIALLY TRUE WHEN IT IS ALMOST TIME TO CLEAN UP, HAVE SNACK, OR GET READY TO GO OUTDOORS. GIVE THE CHILDREN SIMPLE DIRECTIONS FOR WHAT TO DO NEXT. FOR EXAMPLE, FIVE MINUTES BEFORE IT IS TIME TO CLEANUP, WALK AROUND THE ROOM AND MENTION TO THE CHILDREN THAT IT IS ALMOST TIME TO CLEANUP. DURING CLEANUP, REMIND THE CHILDREN WHAT NEEDS TO BE DONE. TELL THE CHILDREN WHAT TO DO OR WHERE TO GO WHEN THEY ARE FINISHED CLEANING UP. FOR EXAMPLE, YOU MIGHT SAY "WHEN YOUR ARE FINISHED WITH THE BLOCKS, YOU MAY PUT YOUR COAT ON TO GET READY TO GO OUTSIDE.


## Stop and Go Signs

MATERIALS: 2 paint stirrers, red and green poster board, marker, stapler or tape, scissors

<u>WHAT TO DO:</u> Create large STOP and GO signs by cutting out a large circle from green poster board and a large circle from the red poster board. Using large letters, write STOP on the red circle and GO on the green circle. Attach the stick to each circle.

At outdoor playtime provide riding vehicles and wagons for the children to use. Stand with the signs in the location where "accidents" are most likely to occur.

Regulate the children's movement using the STOP and GO signs.





## Fifty-yard Swim

Each child hops on one foot, carrying a paper cup of water. First one over the finish line with the most water wins.

## **Table Football**

Give each child a straw, and take a position around the table. With you face level with the tabletop the children blow a pingpong ball placed in the center of the table. Try not to let the ball roll off your side of the table.
